Who is classified as black in terms of the B-BBEE Act?

One of the major challenges of B-BBEE has been the understanding of who is classified as black in South Africa.

'Black people' is a generic term which means Africans, Coloureds and Indians:

- Who are citizens of the Republic of South Africa by birth or descent; or
- Who **became citizens** of the Republic of South Africa by **naturalisation**:
 - before 27 April 1994; or
 - on or after 27 April 1994 and were entitled to acquire citizenship by naturalisation prior to that date.

On 18 June 2008, the **Chinese Association of South Africa** approached the **High Court** with a request that **South African Chinese people** be included in the definition of 'black people'. As such **people of Chinese origin** falling under the **above definition** of (a) and (b) are also classified as black.



Designated groups

Black designated groups form part of the requirements when completing the B-BBEE affidavits or scoring points under the ownership scorecard.

These include:



Unemployed black people not attending and not required by law to attend an educational institution or not awaiting admission to such an institution;



Black people defined as youth by the National Youth Commission Act of 1996;



Black people who are **persons with disabilities** as defined in the Code of Good Practice under the Employment Equity Act;



Black people living in rural and under-developed areas;



Black military veterans who qualify as such in terms of the Military Veterans Act 18 of 2011.



STEPS

The **next steps** we require from you are:



Review your current shareholders and confirm status in terms of the B-BBEE Act.



Complete the correct affidavit to indicate the black shareholding and designated group status.



Use the correct affidavit template supplied in this series.



Submit the latest affidavit to the Santam Transformation team.
